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## NGMTC-STB-CNGB SOP

**1. PURPOSE:** This competition promotes basic individual rifle and pistol marksmanship skills at the unit level by allowing participation by as many competitors as possible.

### **2. RESPONSIBILITIES:**

a. Commander, National Guard Marksmanship Training Center (NGMTC).

(1) Conduct a Chief of National Guard Bureau Marksmanship Competition and clinics to allow ARNG/ANG Soldiers the opportunity to get more involved with the National Guard Marksmanship Competitions.

(2) Supervise CNGB program across National Guard (NG) and validate scores to Commander, U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit (USAMU), Fort Benning, GA.

b. NGMTC Program Manager (PM), CNGB

(1) Maintain records of NG personnel competing in CNGB matches.

(2) Review CNGB records from all participating NG units to determine an order of merit list (OML). The OML will help select the individuals that will be invited to the Phase III (Shoulder-to-Shoulder Match/Clinic) at Camp Robinson, AR.

(3) Review all requested exceptions to the approved CNGB courses of fire before.

c. Marksmanship Advisory Council (MAC) Region Leader

(1) Make contact with State Marksmanship Coordinators to promote the CNGB Program, for maximum participation.

(2) Must forward CNGB Postal Match Phase I results from the SMC to NGMTC, **by the annotated deadline in this SOP.**

d. State Marksmanship Coordinator

(1) Conduct CNGB Program Phase I using the approved CNGB courses of fire and CNGB reference materials to allow ARNG Soldiers in their respective state to get an opportunity to compete in national level marksmanship competition.

(2) Prepare CNGB scorecards and an OML list from your respective state in accordance with this SOP. Route records to MAC Representative through NGMTC. Must forward all CNGB records within respective state to NGMTC, **by the annotated deadline in this SOP.**

(3) Request any required exceptions to the approved combat CNGB courses of fire in their respective state no later than 120 days prior to the intended date of the match.

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(4) Continue to identify new shooters to participate in the CNGB program to support the purpose of the program.

**3. GENERAL.** The National Guard Marksmanship Training Center (NGMTC) sponsors the CNGB PMC. The CNGB PMC has three phases of competition: a Postal Phase, a Regional Paper Match Phase, and a National Championship Shoulder-to-Shoulder Phase. The NGMTC will publish a CNGB SOP and annual Official Match Program (OMP) which addresses specific information on the conduct to Phase III (Shoulder-to-Shoulder) competition. Phase I and Phase II of this program will continue regardless of the available funds to support Phase III.

**a. Phase I - Postal Phase.** The postal phase gives competitors an opportunity to test their marksmanship skills against other Soldiers and Airmen in their unit and state. Matches and results must be fired and forwarded to the NGMTC in accordance with the CNGB SOP. Each Soldier/Airman can compete as many times as desired, but only one result can be submitted for scoring. Once submitted to the NGMTC, then no other results for that individual will be accepted. The SMC is encouraged to coordinate with their local DCSOPs for the issuance of an Operation Order that details this competition to their Army/Air National Guard members and to ensure availability of Laser Marksmanship Training Systems (LMTS) to all units, as well as the NGMTC issued Daisy air rifles. Each unit level command is encouraged to assign a match facilitator and provide necessary support for completion of the postal phase. The winner from each state/region will receive an award from NGMTC.

**(1) DEADLINE:** NLT 15 APRIL of each FY, PHASE I results must be turned in to NGMTC. Email the Results to [ng.ar.aranng.mbx.ngmtc@mail.mil](mailto:ng.ar.aranng.mbx.ngmtc@mail.mil). Label the email subject line “AR (respective state)\_CNGB PH I Results”

**b. Phase II – Regional “Paper Match” Phase.** This phase is conducted at NGMTC once all Phase I scores are turned in. An Order of Merit List (OML) will be created for each MAC Region based on the postal match scores. The top three competitors from each MAC (first, second, and third) will receive a regional championship award. The type of coin or award depends on the competitors placing: gold for first place, silver for second place, and bronze for third place. NGMTC will use the postal match scores to determine National level OML list to invite the top competitors from each region to the Phase III match/clinic. MAC Reps will assist NGMTC to field a minimum of one four-member team per region from the OML to participate in Phase III. Additional teams may be funded as the yearly budget allows. Each team may only have one competitor that is distinguished in any discipline.

**(1) DEADLINE.** NLT 31 MAY of each FY, PHASE II results published and awards will be sent to the units or Soldiers.

**(2) SCORING FORMAT.** Use Excel to provide the list of competitors, with the correct information. Rank, Name (Last, First MI.), Scores (Rifle – Standing, Kneeling, Prone)/(Pistol – Standing, Kneeling, Prone), Totals for each, Overall Total. Must provide a main POC to help make sure that all awards for Phase I and II are delivered to the Soldier or Airman. NGMTC prefers to send all the awards to one individual to distribute to the Soldier or Airman. Ideally this individual should be the SMC.

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**c. Phase III - Shoulder-to-Shoulder Phase.** This phase is a multi-day individual and team live fire competition conducted in accordance with the annual OMP. A team (or teams) of competitors from each MAC Region OML will receive invitations to compete. Competitors receiving invitations to attend Phase III must confirm their registration with the NGMTC in accordance with the OMP. Phase III of the CNGB is based on the availability of funds for that FY.

**(1) DEADLINE:** PHASE III Matches/Clinic will be conducted in September during FY's with shortage of funds, if funding are available. If a shortage of funds isn't an issue then NGMTC will plan Phase III 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter (Apr-Jun) timeframe.

**3. PARTICIPATION IN CNGB MATCHES.** All Army (AR) and Air (A) National Guard members are allowed to participate in the CNGB program. The unit commander and the SMC for the respective state will be responsible for screening the Soldier or Airmen for any profiles that may prevent him/her from participating in a marksmanship competition.

### **4. UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT.**

**a. UNIFORM. Individual Participants.** ACU/ABU uniform. Issued combat helmets (ACH) are not required for the LMTS or Air Rifle options. It may be left to the Match Directors discretion for shooters while on the firing line for the CNGB-PMC Live Fire Rifle Match option. Uniform and equipment must be as issued by parent unit (CANNOT BE MODIFIED).

#### **b. EQUIPMENT.**

**(1)** Load Carrying Equipment (LCE/LCV/MOLLE) is not required for the LMTS or Air Rifle and is optional for the CNGB-PMC Live Fire Rifle Match option. It will be left to the Match Director's discretion to decide if equipment is worn or not. If worn, the minimum equipment will consist of the following items.

**(2)** Pistol Belts. If required by the Load Bearing Harness/Vest (must be fastened while shooting).

**(3)** Load bearing Harness / Vest.

**(4)** One military issue water source.

**(5)** Pistol holster (either hip or leg attached) with retention device required for pistol matches (note: no cross draw or shoulder holsters are authorized)

**(6)** Protective Eyewear from the Authorized Protective Eyewear List (APEL). Only clear or smoke tinted lenses are allowed. There will be no Amber, yellow or any other light enhancing lenses allowed.

**(7)** Hearing Protection

**(8)** Additional Participant Equipment:

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-Issued cold weather undergarments and combat sweaters are permitted.

-Issued wet weather clothing can be worn, including overshoes, ponchos, raincoats and trousers.

-Issued full fingered gloves (without any modification) can be worn. Shooting gloves or mitts are not allowed. Gloves must be worn in pairs.

-Issued elbow and kneepads are allowed.

### c. Optical Aids:

**(1) Sighting Devices:** Altering, covering, or modifying eyeglass lenses are not permitted. Uses of an eye patch covering the non-firing eye are not permitted. Sighting devices, such as Gehmann clip on iris, Merit adjustable aperture, or Knobloch adjustable shooting glasses, are not permitted. This also includes putting blinders on helmets.

**(2) Binoculars and Telescopes:** Binoculars (10 power magnification or less) and telescopes (not to exceed 82mm and 60 power magnification for competitors and 100mm for coaches) with stands or rests are allowed per the Advanced Marksmanship Task as prescribed in the match program.

**d. WEAPON INFORMATION: Authorized U.S. Service Weapon.** The authorized weapon is the standard issued by the U.S. Government. Weapons must be serviceable IAW the appropriate service regulations and technical manuals. Commercial equivalents are not allowed. Non-issued parts are not authorized. Filing, honing, sanding, or altering of issue parts is not authorized unless approved by the appropriate regulations and technical manuals

**(1) Service Rifle.** The service rifle is the standard 5.56mm M16A2, M16A4/M4. Parts **MAY NOT** be interchanged between different rifle types. Commercial equivalent and heavy barrels are not allowed. Participants cannot replace M16A2 trigger components with those from an M16A1. M16A1 rifles are not authorized. M16A4 uppers can be used with an M16A2 lower or vice-versa. Safety blocks/safety flags are mandatory and must remain in the weapon at all times until directed otherwise.

**(2) Service Pistol.** The service pistol is the standard M9 or M11. Pistols must be fired double action for the first round of each stage and drawn from the holster unless otherwise directed.

**(3) Sights.** Iron sights must be as issued. Iron sights can be blackened; however, no appliances can be affixed to shade or alter the standard sight. Rifle sights can be adjusted at any time utilizing proper safety procedures, unless directed otherwise by range staff personnel. Optics are not authorized for use.

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**(4) Rifle Sling.** Only issued slings are allowed. Slings can be no more than 3 centimeters wide. It may be used as a single point sling attached to the front sling swivel or as a 2-point sling attached to both sling swivels. The sling must not be attached to the rifle in such a manner as to restrict the participant from handling the weapon in a safe manner. Slings are not required.

**(5) Trigger and Weapon.** Triggers must meet service weight standards and requirements.

**(6) Air Rifles.** The NGMTC issued Daisy Avanti Air Rifle, and its equivalent, are authorized for the Phase I match.

## 5. ARNG CNGB COURSE OF FIRE (COF) MATCH STANDARDS

### a. TASK 1. LMTS CNGB Rifle Match 1

(1) **CONDITIONS.** As a participant with an M-16 series rifle, LMTS, 1 TR 900 Target, and one (1) empty magazine, complete 3 stages on a 20 meter range in no more than 3 minutes per stage, 10 shots per stage. Optics are not allowed.

(2) **STANDARD.** Achieve the highest number of points possible. The maximum point value is 100 points per stages, 300 total points. Prone position may rest magazine on floor. No other support authorized. UNIFORM: ACU/ABU (Note: Official time passed for every stage should be kept by a digital stop watch as the clock on the program has shown to be inaccurate on some systems. If the audible beep cannot be heard, or does not otherwise work properly; a command of “fire” and “cease fire” may be used in order to signify the beginning and end of firing time).

### (3) THREE STAGES OF FIRE (Prone, Standing, Kneeling).



(4) **INSTRUCTIONS.** Stages 1-3 will begin at the 20 meter firing line. At the command "load and make ready", shooters will "lock and load" with one empty magazine\* and assume the appropriate position. At the command "Standby", shooters should wait for the beep, firing begins after the beep is heard and ends with the buzzer. In all stages shooters engage target with 10 shots from the appropriate position in 3 minutes or less. Magazines can have the spring and follower removed to facilitate charging. Shooters may support the weapon on the ground with the magazine only, no other support is authorized. Shooters should move the rifle off the target when charging and moving the selector from safe to semi in order to avoid unintentional firing of the LMTS laser. Target is the TR 900 Standard LMTS system Target.

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### b. TASK 2. LMTS CNGB Pistol Match 1

(1) **CONDITIONS.** As a participant with an M-9/M-11 pistol, LMTS system and one (1) empty magazine, complete 3 stages on a 10 meter range, Slow Fire in no more than 3 minutes, 10 shots total at 1 TR 900 target. **UNIFORM:** ACU/ABU (Note: Official time passed for every stage should be kept by a digital stop watch as the clock on the program has shown to be inaccurate on some systems. If the audible beep cannot be heard, or does not otherwise work properly; a command of “fire” and “cease fire” may be used in order to signify the beginning and end of firing time).

(2) **STANDARD.** Achieve the highest number of points possible. The maximum point value is 100 per stage with a total of 300 match points.

#### (3) THREE STAGES OF FIRE (Prone, Standing, Kneeling).



(4) **INSTRUCTION.** Stages 1-3 will begin at the 10 meter firing line. At the command "load and make ready" , shooters will "lock and load" with one empty magazine\* and assume the appropriate position. At the command "Standby", shooters should wait for the beep, firing begins after the beep is heard and ends with the buzzer. In all stages shooters engage target with 10 shots from the appropriate position in 3 minutes or less. *Shooters may choose double or single action for the LMTS only.* Shooters may support the weapon on the ground during the prone stage. Target is the default 1 TR 900 Target.



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## c. ALTERNATE RIFLE COF 10 Meter Air Rifle Match/ 5.3.2 Individual Event 3X10

(1) **CONDITIONS.** As a participant with a Daisy Avanti Air Rifle, pellets, and 3 X 10 Meter Air Rifle Targets, complete 3 stages on a 10 meter range, slow fire in no more than 7 minutes for each stage. **UNIFORM:** ACU/ABU (Note: Official time passed for every stage should be kept by a digital stop watch. If the audible beep cannot be heard, or does not otherwise work properly; a command of “fire” and “cease fire” may be used in order to signify the beginning and end of firing time).

(2) **STANDARD.** Achieve the highest number of points possible. The maximum point value is 100 per stage with a total of 300 match points.

### (3) THREE STAGES OF FIRE (Prone, Standing, Kneeling).



(4) **INSTRUCTION.** Stages 1-3 will begin at the 10 meter firing line. At the command "load and make ready", shooters will "lock and load" and assume the appropriate position. At the command "Standby", shooters should wait for the command of "fire", firing begins after the "fire" is heard and ends with the buzzer or command of "cease fire". In all stages shooters engage target with 10 shots from the appropriate position in 7 minutes or less. Shooters are authorized 5 minutes and 2 sighting shots from each position. Target is the 10 meter 3 position Air Rifle Target.


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### d. ALTERNATE RIFLE COF CNGB-PMC Live Fire Rifle Match

(1) **CONDITIONS.** As a participant with an M-16 series rifle and one (3) 10 round magazines, complete 3 stages on a 25 meter range in no more than 3 minutes per stage, 10 shots per stage. Optics are not allowed.


(2) **STANDARD:** Achieve the highest number of points possible. The maximum point value is 100 points per stages, 300 total points. Prone position may rest magazine on ground. No other support authorized. **UNIFORM:** ACU/ABU, ACH and LBV are optional.


#### (4) THREE STAGES OF FIRE (Prone, Standing, Kneeling).



(4) **INSTRUCTION.** Stages 1-3 will begin at the 10 meter firing line. At the command "load and make ready", shooters will "lock and load" and assume the appropriate position. At the command "Standby", shooters should wait for the command of "fire", firing begins after the "fire" is heard and ends with the buzzer or command of "cease fire". In all stages shooters engage target with 10 shots from the appropriate position in 7 minutes or less. Shooters are authorized 5 minutes and 2 sighting shots from each position. Target is the 10 meter 3 position Air Rifle Target.

### e. WEAPON STATUS COMMANDS.





## 6. FIRING POSITIONS.

**a. PISTOL FIRING POSITIONS DEFINED:** In pistol matches, the authorized fire position is the "Standing Position" unless otherwise stated in match conditions. The pistol can be fired from either or both hands unless specified by match conditions. During matches where the participant must draw and fire, no part of the holster or weapon should be touched prior to the command "fire".

**(1) Stage Starting Position "INTERVIEW POSITION":** Standing position with the pistol in the "load" status, in the holster and the retention device engaged. Competitors will be in the interview position or hands in front of their body with their arms bent at 90 degrees or greater. There can be no contact between the weapon or holster and the competitors' hands. The pistol will be on safe and secured in the holster. Once the stage has commenced the competitor may stay on target or return to the "alert" position until the start of the next stage unless instructed to do so by the tower. As long as the weapon is pointed in a safe direction the competitor may choose to stay on target or lower their point of aim during the stage. The competitors hands do not have to be touching, however, they must be in front of the body and the elbows bent 90 degrees.

**(2) Standing Position:** Both feet on the ground, body erect, arms extended, and not supported by any other object. Participants' knees can be slightly bent. **Squatting is not permitted.**

**(3) Kneeling Position:** Participants can only make contact with the ground with their knee(s) and feet. At least one knee must touch the ground.

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**(4) Prone Position:** The participant must lie on the ground in horizontal position. The body must be generally perpendicular to the firing line not to exceed a 45 degree angle from the target. **No part of the body or the weapon system will be forward of the line. Nothing will be past the firing line.**

**(5) Alert Position:** “Standing” position with the pistol at waist level, muzzle pointed down range, barrel parallel to the ground in the “Weapon off Safe” status.

**b. RIFLE FIRING POSITIONS DEFINED:** No alteration can be made to the firing point which assists a participant in holding the rifle steady. Safety, stability, and reduced visibility to enemy observation are important points to consider in firing positions. Unless specified by the match conditions, positions are unsupported. At the beginning of every stage competitors will start from the alert position with the butt of the weapon out of the shoulder. There will be no contact between the weapon and the shoulder of the competitor.

**(1) Stage Starting Position:** “Standing” position with the butt of the rifle out of the shoulder, weapon pointed down range while the weapon is in the “load” status. There can be no contact between the weapon and the competitors’ shoulder. Once the stage has commenced the competitor may stay on target or return to the “alert” position until the start of the next stage unless instructed to do so by the tower. As long as the weapon is pointed in a safe direction the competitor may choose to stay on target or lower their point of aim with the weapon pointed in a safe direction.

**(2) Standing Position:** Rifle butt must rest against the shoulder or armpit, both feet on the ground, body erect, and legs uncrossed. No part of the body other than the feet may touch the ground or any other supporting object. The rifle must be held with both hands.

**(3) Kneeling Position:** Rifle butt must rest against the shoulder or armpit, Participants can only make contact with the ground with their knee(s) and feet. At least one knee must touch the ground with no part of the body except one foot and the other leg from the knee downwards touching the ground or any other supporting object.

**(4) Prone Position:** Rifle butt must rest against the shoulder or armpit. Participants must lie on the ground in horizontal position, with at least one elbow touching the ground. The body must be generally perpendicular to the firing line not to exceed a 45 degree angle from the target. Magazines may be rested on the ground. Tripods or additional support are not authorized. Forearm pistol/vertical grips and similar devices are not allowed to be utilized in the prone position. The competitor may not in any way attempt to gain additional support with the ground through the use of the forearm pistol/vertical grips.

**(5) Alert Position:** “Standing” position with the muzzle depressed at an angle of 45 degrees from horizontal in the “Load” status.

### 7. SCORING. LMTS/Air Rifle/ CNGB-PMC Live Fire 25m reduced target SCORING

**a. Targets** will be scored using the LMTS, the NRA 3 Position Air Rifle Target, or the CNGB-PMC Live Fire 25m reduced target. Targets will be scored locally by the Match Director

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and sent to the NGMTC (mailed or scanned and emailed) through each SMC and MAC regional representative. Each SMC or unit will produce a results bulletin. The results bulletin for each course of fire will be forwarded by the Unit to the SMC. The SMC will then route a results bulletin and the target printouts, through the MAC Representative, to the NGMTC. A results bulletin is required for each course of fire. The competitor must compete in both the rifle and pistol course of fire. Individual competitors are responsible for verifying administrative information is correct for the results bulletin prior to conducting a match and saving the scores. The results bulletin will include the DTG, location, rank, name, unit, unit phone number, and a POC for the Unit.

**(1) Tie breaking procedures.** Ties for overall aggregate scores (rifle and pistol combined) will be broken for the top four competitors in each MAC region. The tie must be broken in favor of the competitor with the greater number of Xs, 10s, then 9s, then 8s, and etc. in all courses of fire.

**(2) TARGET PREPARATION:** Participants and/or teams are responsible for the preparation and proper maintenance of their targets. Participants/teams are not allowed to mark their targets in any manner to gain an advantage. Participants can only document information on their targets when directed by range staff. The CNGB-PMC Live Fire 25m reduced target can be printed by using Annex E of this OMP.

**(3)** CNGB-PMC Live Fire targets shall be printed locally on 8.5”x11” manila card stock in the required quantities.

**(4)** The printed dimensions should be 1.0 cm = X-ring, 2.5 cm = 10-ring, and 10.0 cm = 7-ring or scoring black.

**b. SCORING:** When scoring a shot that touches the line between two scoring divisions of the target, the participant is credited with the higher value. A shot on the line between two tombstones goes to the advantage of the shooter. Individuals or team captains are responsible for verifying the information and score recorded and submitting scorecards prior to leaving the range.

**(1) Excessive hits:** The Range OIC can disqualify the score for that stage or from the remainder of the match for a breach of rules violation when excess hits are determined to not be from crossfire and were made by the participant or team firing more than the number of shots allowed.

**(2) Crossfire:** If crossfire occurs, begin taking the low and then high hits off of the total alternately, until the correct number of hits is reached. For example, a target with 13 hits when it should have 10 hits would have the two lowest score hits removed and the highest score hits removed (low, high, low).

**(3) Refire:** The Range OIC may direct a re-fire for any stage or match as necessary to ensure fair conduct.

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(4) **Alibis:** The only alibis allowed are range alibis to be determined by the OIC of the range

c. **TIMING:** A stopwatch is used for the timing of exposures. An audible device or the facing of targets is used to signal the fire and cease fire command. Shots fired through the sound of the horn are acceptable. Shots fired after the cease fire signal has ended do not count.

### d. TIE BREAKING PROCEDURES

(1) **PISTOL:** Ties are broken in following steps in order. Ties in individual matches are broken by the following steps in order. Highest number of Xs, 10s, 9s, 8s, etc. For example, if all tied competitors have the same amount of Xs then resolve the tie by the highest number of 10s. If a tie still exists then continue on to the next lower value until there is a difference in the amount of hits. The tie goes to the competitor with the highest amount of hits in the corresponding value. If a tie still exists the Match Director determines the tie breaking procedure.


(2) **RIFLE:** Ties are broken in following steps in order. Highest number of Xs, 10s, 9s, 8s, etc. For example, if all tied competitors have the same amount of Xs then resolve the tie by the highest number of 10s. If a tie still exists then continue on to the next lower value until there is a difference in the amount of hits. The tie goes to the competitor with the highest amount of hits in the corresponding value. If a tie still exists the Match Director determines the tie breaking procedure.


**TR-900 TARGET**
